Committee Charge

- How the needs of Kennebunkport older residents can be met

What We Did

- 21 meetings over 12 month period for discussion and consideration
- A survey of all residents 65 and older
- Interviews and visits with
 - Relevant Town departments
 - Local and regional providers of services to older residents

Why It Is Important

- By 2030, one in five Americans will be 65 or older
- Maine is the grayest state in the US with a median age of 44
- Kennebunkport must be ready

What the Town told us

 Kennebunkport is a good place to live for older residents

"Great place to live and grow old"

- Kennebunkport is a very social town 83% are "as social as I want to be"
- The Town Nurse is a great asset "One of the most valuable services the Town provides"

Assets

- The Town Nurse/Health Department & KEMS
- The Parks and Rec. Department
- The Town Libraries
- The Department of Public Works
- The Center at Lower Village

Challenges

- The survey and interviews indicated the following needs:
 - Transportation
 - Home repairs, maintenance and shoveling

Areas That Could Be Improved

- Coordination among providers of services
- Communication about existing services including:
 - Fuel assistance
 - Home weatherization
 - Food outreach

Some Definitions of Common Terms

- An Age-Friendly Community encourages active aging by optimizing opportunities for health, participation and security in order to enhance quality of life as people age. (WHO)
- Aging in Place is simply a matter of preserving the ability for people to remain in their home or neighborhood as long as possible. (AARP)

Aspirations

Our vision is for Kennebunkport to foster an age-friendly community that allows people, regardless of their age, to stay active and connected, and to thrive while aging in place.

Do Kennebunkport Residents Wish to Age in Place?

- > 90% wish to remain in their current home as long as possible.
- The same 90% want to "drive as long as I can."

Challenges to Aging in Place in Kennebunkport

- Transportation
- Housing
- Walkability

What Makes an Age-Friendly Community*?

- One that is friendly for all ages and has:
 - Walkable streets
 - Housing and transportation options
 - Access to key services
 - Opportunities for residents to readily participate in social and community activities
