Each year as we decide to whom we should dedicate the Town Report, we are amazed at the amount of fantastic people in our community. This was exemplified in Jim Fitzgerald. The news of Jim's passing was shocking to many.

Born in Baltimore, Maryland, and raised in Wildwood Crest, New Jersey, Jim moved to Maine after serving in the Air Force. Jim flew B-52's throughout the Vietnam War, first reporting to Craig Air Force Base in Selma, AL, then on to Guam, and remaining in southern Vietnam for the remainder of the war. After first moving to the Portland area, Jim made his way to Kennebunkport in 1997 where he met the love of his life, Betsy. They were married in Cape Porpoise and had one daughter, Cheyenne. Jim was not only committed to serving his country but also his local community.

He was a resident of Kennebunkport from 1997 until his passing in December of 2022. He was a committed volunteer on a number of Town Boards and Committees, including the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Growth Planning Committee, where he served as Vice-Chair. In addition to his work with the Town, he was a member of the Kennebunkport Business Association, served as President of the Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Arundel Chamber of Commerce, and on the Board of Directors for the Kennebunkport Heritage Housing Trust. He served as the Chair of the York County Community College Board of Directors and was a Board Member of the United Way of York County and Chair of the Annual United Way Appeal in 2009, earning the Elise Kittredge Award in 2015 for his work with the organization.

His generosity and passion for giving back to the community will be remembered, as will his kindness, sense of humor, and warm nature.

WARRANT ANNUAL TOWN MEETING June 13 and 17, 2023

State of Maine County of York, SS.

To: Rebecca Nolette, Constable of the Town of Kennebunkport, in the County of York, State of Maine.

You are hereby required in the name of the State of Maine to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Kennebunkport in said County and State of the Town Meeting described in this warrant.

GREETINGS:

To the voters of Kennebunkport: You are hereby notified that the Annual Town Meeting of this municipality will be held at Village Fire Station, located at 32 North Street, in said Town on Tuesday, June 13, 2023, at 8:00 a.m. for the purpose of acting on Articles numbered one a (1a) and one (1) as set out below. The polls for voting on Article 1 shall be opened immediately after the election of the Moderator at 8:00 a.m. on June 13, 2023, and shall close at 8:00 p.m. While the polls are open, the Registrar of Voters will hold office hours to accept the registration of any person eligible to vote, to accept new enrollments, and to make any necessary corrections or changes to any names or addresses on the voting list. The continuation of said meeting will be held in the gymnasium of the Kennebunkport Consolidated School located at 25 School Street on Saturday, June 17, 2023, at 9:00 a.m. for the purpose of acting on Articles numbered 2 through 12 as set out below.

ARTICLE 1a. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 1. To elect under the provisions of Title 30-A, M.R.S.A. Section 2528, the following Town Officers: one (1) Selectmen, for a term of three years and one (1) Director of Regional School Unit No. 21, for a term of three years; and to vote on the following referendum questions 1-6.

For each Question 1 through 4, a certified copy of the proposed ordinance is on file in the Town Clerk's Office and is incorporated by reference into each Question.

QUESTION 1 AMENDMENT TO THE KENNEBUNKPORT TOWN CODE, CHAPTER 5 – ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

Shall an ordinance entitled "June 2023 Amendment to the Administrative Code - Boards and Committees" be enacted?

[Note of explanation: This amendment seeks to change the composition of the Cape Porpoise Pier Committee by having at least 75% of the membership made up of Commercial Fisherman instead of 75% of registered voters of Kennebunkport. It also adds a definition of Commercial fisherman.]

QUESTION 2 AMENDMENT TO THE KENNEBUNKPORT TOWN CODE, CHAPTER 5 - ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

Shall an ordinance entitled "June 2023 Amendment to Administrative Code - Annual and Special Town Meetings" be enacted?

[Note of explanation: This amendment changes annual town meeting from the Saturday following the 2nd Tuesday in June to the Wednesday evening following the 2nd Tuesday in June.]

QUESTION 3 AMENDMENT TO THE KENNEBUNKPORT TOWN CODE CHAPTER 240 - LAND USE ORDINANCE – TERMINOLOGY, ACCESSORY APARTMENTS

Shall an ordinance entitled "June 2022 Amendment to Kennebunkport Town Code, Chapter 240 -Terminology (regarding Accessory Apartments)" be enacted?

[Note of explanation: This amendment would revise the standards that govern Accessory Apartments, for the principal purpose of bringing them into compliance with a recently enacted state law governing housing also known as LD 2003.]

QUESTION 4 AMENDMENT TO KENNEBUNKPORT TOWN CODE, CHAPTER 240 - LAND USE ORDINANCE – TOWN-WIDE REGULATIONS (PRIVATE ROAD CONSTRUCTION)

Shall an ordinance entitled "June 2022 Amendment to the Kennebunkport Town Code, Chapter 240 – Land Use Ordinance – Town-wide Regulations (private road construction" be enacted?

[Note of explanation: This amendment would add performance standards and technical diagrams regarding turn around requirements for new or expanded private roads. The turnaround requirements are based on the needs of a new ladder truck for which the town has entered into a lease purchase arrangement.]

QUESTION 5 AUTHORIZE EASEMENT DEED FOR ST. ANN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Shall the Town grant an easement over Town-owned property from Ocean Avenue over Old Fort Avenue (Map 7/Block 1/Lot 8) to St. Ann's Episcopal Church for the Church to reconstruct and perform ongoing maintenance of the existing seawall?

[Note of explanation: This would grant St. Ann's Episcopal Church an easement to access the seawall for maintenance and reconstruction.]

QUESTION 6 AUTHORIZE PURCHASE & SALE AGREEMENT TO PURCHASE LAND ON LANGSFORD ROAD FOR BOAT ACCESS

Shall the Town expend \$275,000 from the Capital Reserve Account to purchase a ~0.1-acre parcel of land situated on Langsford Road at Map 29/Block 1/Lot 3 to provide boat access to Cape Porpoise Harbor for Town residents and Cape Porpoise mooring holders?

[Note of explanation: This would authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase land situated on Langsford Road to provide boat access to Cape Porpoise Harbor. This purchase would not increase the tax rate because the funds will come from the Capital Reserve Fund.]

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following:

- A. To authorize the Town Treasurer, with the advice and approval of the Municipal Officers on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of Real Estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, and to execute quitclaim deeds on such terms as they deem advisable, and to authorize the Treasurer to discharge unmatured liens on payment of taxes, interest and costs.
- B. To authorize the Town Treasurer, with the advice and approval of the Municipal Officers on behalf of the Town, to waive the foreclosure of any tax lien mortgage by recording a waiver of foreclosure in the York County Registry of Deeds for any real estate title to which they deem not in the best financial interest of the Town to hold, said authorization to waive not to prevent the Town Treasurer, with the advice and approval of the Municipal Officers, from later foreclosing on said tax lien pursuant to law, as they deem advisable.
- C. To make all real and personal property taxes due and payable upon presentment of bills and to charge eight percent (8.00%) per annum on the first half if unpaid after September 11, 2023 (or 45 days after the date of commitment if commitment is after July 21, 2023) and on the second half if unpaid after March 10, 2024.
- D. To set the interest rate to be paid by the Town on abated taxes at eight percent (8.00%) for the fiscal year 2024.
- E. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to enter into a standard agreement with taxpayers establishing a "tax club" payment plan for commercial and/or residential real estate property taxes. (Explanation: This article allows the Town to establish a tax club for citizens, similar to a Christmas club. Citizens establish a payment plan so that they can make monthly payments throughout the year without risk of penalties or interest charges.)

Selectmen recommend adoption of this article—Voted: 5-0

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following:

- A. To authorize the Selectmen to pay for tax abatements and applicable interest granted during the fiscal year of 2023/2024 from Overlay. (Explanation: The Selectmen, as Assessors, are authorized to raise Overlay under Title 36 MRSA section 710 but require voter authorization to spend Overlay. Overlay cannot be more than 5% of the Tax Commitment.)
- B. To authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend from the following categories of funds as provided by the State of Maine: Municipal Revenue Sharing, Educational Certification Block Grant, Educational Tax Relief Grant, Public Library State Aid, Urban Rural Road Initiative Program, Civil Emergency Funds, Snowmobile Registration Funds, Tree Growth Reimbursement, General Assistance Reimbursement, Veterans Exemption Reimbursement, Department of Economic & Community Development Grant Program, Maine Emergency Management Agency, Homestead Exemption Reimbursement, and all other state and federal grants and funds including, when necessary, the authority to sign grant contracts, documents or other paperwork?

C. To authorize the Selectmen to carry forward unencumbered surplus fund balances on June 30, 2024, for the purposes originally appropriated and to appropriate such fund balances for such purposes to the extent the Selectmen deem advisable, such determination to be made at a properly noticed meeting of the Board of Selectmen.

Selectmen recommend adoption of this article—Voted: 5-0 Budget Board recommends adoption of this article—Voted: 11-0

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following:

- A. To authorize the Tax Collector or Treasurer to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506.
- B. To authorize the Selectmen to accept easement deeds on behalf of the Town granting the Town the right to plant and maintain certain trees on private property located within the Town.
- C. To authorize the Selectmen to accept unconditional and conditional gifts of money or property on behalf of the Town, other than gifts of sewer extensions, subject to ratification by the Town at an annual or special town meeting held within one year of the Selectmen's acceptance, except that such ratification shall not be required for a donation of money to the Town to supplement a specific appropriation already made, to reduce the tax assessment, or to reduce the permanent debt.


Budget Overview

A budget can appear to merely be a book full of numbers, each one adding to the grand total. The truth is a budget document tells the story of a community's values. Where we choose to expend our funds defines our principles and our goals for the future. If this is true, then what does this budget tell you about Kennebunkport?

The budgetary pie chart shows that we value education, with almost 45% of our expenditures in support of RSU 21. Kennebunkport, much like other towns in Maine, values service delivery to residents, with just over 30% directed towards the labor and supplies necessary to fulfill these municipal functions. Our town values partners in service, as almost 3% funds KEMS, our two libraries and multiple social service agencies. Where we might differ from other towns and cities is the value we place on future planning.

Almost 9% of our budget is spent on capital expenditures. Our capital accounts are often funding reserves for future needs and our determination to adequately fund capital and debt, at 5%, signifies the importance of maintaining assets. This forward approach allows us to deftly handle emergency situations and provide a plan for future generations.

Each budget year has its own unique fiscal challenges. It would be easy to budget if funding was not a concern; however, a budget that addresses the needs of the community while balancing the ability of property owners to pay is the real challenge. While wrestling with this fact it is easy to get swept away with singular year thinking. What do we absolutely need today?



A good budget, though, builds upon the foundational work of previous years and creates a sound platform for the following year budget. The FY24 proposed budget continues the work of climate change, enhanced service delivery, capital investment, and future planning, and creates a sustainable model on which the FY25 budget may rest.

The municipal budget has an estimated tax rate increase of \$0.14 for municipal operations. Municipal expenditures are \$12.3 million, up by \$557,401 or 4.7%. Operations are up \$427,352 or 5.12%; whereas capital is increasing by \$30,700 or 1.41%, and debt service has increased by \$99,349. Once the revenues and transfers have been taken into account, the total tax rate increase is projected at \$0.22 or a 3.73% increase. Appreciating that the consumer price index increased by 6.5% in December 2022, this budget is under the current fiscal climate.

Expenses

The expenses in the budget are up \$557,401. The following items are primary drivers of that increase.

Legal fees have gone up as the hourly rate charges have increased over the past two years. Current billable rates range from \$195 to \$220 per hour depending upon the experience of the attorney. It is imperative that the Town have legal advice available for a wide range of issues.

The Public Works <u>salt line</u> increased by \$15,800 as salt prices increased from \$58/ton to \$78/ton or 34%. The department normally uses approximately 1,200 tons each winter to treat the roads. The FY24 budget accounts for only 1,100 tons, as staff anticipate savings from the mild 22-23 winter.

The increases in <u>fuel</u> lines are attributable to the rising cost of heating fuel (oil and propane) and gas and diesel. You can see the differences in budget prices below:

Graves Library has requested an additional \$30,000 appropriation in FY24. The Town provides just under 40% of their annual budget. The library has seen inflationary costs impact their operations, most notably wage increases.

KEMS has requested an additional \$50,000 to support emergency medical services. Their organization depends on paramedic level service, and they are competing with other emergency services for the same pool of employees. Much of this increase is related to the labor costs of their service and the declining reimbursements from insurance companies. The Town's contribution has grown from 32% to 39% of their total budget and is expected to continue to grow.

<u>Capital</u> increases reflect the ever-increasing costs for vehicles and pavement. The road and sidewalk projects equate to almost 38% of the capital budget.

The \$99,349 increase in debt service funding is due to the new annual lease payment to purchase a ladder truck. Due to the ever-increasing pace of equipment prices the Board of Selectmen decided in 2022 to purchase a new ladder truck a year early using the reserve funds and a lease-purchase agreement for the balance of the truck. The lease purchase requires a yearly payment over the next five years. The funding for the Fire apparatus reserve has been reduced to compensate for the new ladder truck lease payment.

<u>Wage</u> increases amount to over \$225,196 across all general fund departments. These wages reflect a cost-of-living adjustment for all positions along with \$17,000 in hiring bonuses for new police officers. Just like all employers, the town has found itself in a very competitive labor market and we are using all available incentives to attract good team members. FY24 is the last year of our current labor contract and as such we have been spared some of the wage increases neighboring communities are experiencing, which have averaged between 5 – 8% over the last two years.

Debt Service

The debt service account is increasing by \$99,349 due to the new annual lease payment to purchase a ladder truck. The lease purchase requires a yearly payment over the next five years. The funding for the Fire apparatus reserve has been reduced to compensate for the new ladder truck lease payment. In FY25 the debt payments will increase as we finalize the \$6.0 million wastewater bond. Together the capital and debt service budgets create a long-term capital investment plan.

The use of debt is integral to our capital planning. Due to their longevity, sometimes expenditures are better shared with future users of the investment. A school building or a seawall are both very expensive items that serve current and future residents. Financing expenditures allows the Town to take advantage of current costs while sharing the cost of an investment with all the people who will benefit from it.

The Town's debt service schedule is in the chart to the right. In FY25, a balloon payment on the Village Parcel bond will be due. The debt was structured in this manner to allow the Town the most flexibility in bonding. The Town has the option of refinancing all or a portion of the debt. The current plan is to refinance it over 15 years. The next debt retirement will be in 2024 when the \$1.0 million wastewater bond retires.

Beyond the normal capital items, I am also proposing new projects which are detailed below:

 Administration is requesting \$15,000 for a website overhaul. The current website was last updated approximately 9 years ago. Although it was a vast improvement from our original site, our citizens dependence on the information contained on our website has grown dramatically. The industry standard is a revamp every 3-5 years, so we are overdue. • The Fire capital request includes \$80,000 for the design and engineering of the new Village Fire Station and \$30,000 for a Public Safety study. The Village Fire Station is one of our four fire stations. It is home to our administrative space and holds the largest number of vehicles and equipment. As the demands on fire services expand and our number of qualified volunteer firefighters decrease, the need to transition to a per diem firefighter workforce is on the horizon. The renovations will provide the space to accommodate per diem fire fighters, consolidate equipment between stations, and provide offices for the Fire Department and KEMS.

There is also a \$30,000 request for a public safety study. With the shrinking available paramedic and firefighter labor force, and the declining reimbursements for ambulance calls, it is imperative that the Town examine the best ways to address its future needs. The study will review the manner in which fire services and EMS services are provided within the Town of Kennebunkport. This includes a review of response metrics, staffing patterns, budgeting, service levels, response times, current facilities, equipment, and an evaluation of the level of risk facing the Town. Using this review as a basis, the study will assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the current model, while identifying the costs, barriers, and potential benefits of different organizational models.

 Emergency Management is requesting \$10,000 to purchase additional supplies to barricade roadways during flooding incidents. We are experiencing street flooding due to higher tides and storm surge on a more frequent basis. There are approximately a dozen places in Town that flood about 10 times a year, and the frequency seems to be increasing. The ability of our staff to respond to each area is hampered by the lack of traffic available barricades. cones and appropriate signage. The request for FY24 would allow us to ensure we have an adequate supply. We may request a trailer for easier transport in FY25.

 The special projects request is \$535,000 this year. This includes \$385,000 for the purchase of waste and recycling bins, \$100,000 for engineering and design on Ocean Avenue, and \$50,000 for streetlight replacements.

The Town currently contracts with Casella for waste and recycling collection. This contract will expire at the end of August in 2024. The Town will likely need to move to automated collection in order to secure a contract with a vendor. Cities and Towns are moving to automated collection due to a reduction in work-related injuries, difficulties in finding workers for manual trash collection, the shortage of truck drivers, and the efficiencies realized in the automated process. For towns, the system can maintain cleanliness and sanitation throughout the community as the cans help keep pests out of trash bags. Although the contract won't end until the beginning of FY25, the Town must have the funds in place in order to procure the bins in time.

The request for engineering and design on Ocean Avenue deals with a flooding issue at Wandby Beach and at the entrance to Walker's Point. Ocean Avenue experiences flooding with high tides and storm surge at these two locations. In the recent December 23, 2022 storm our culvert system that drains water from the pond on the other side of Ocean Avenue was devastated by years of high flows. Although the culvert was repaired temporarily, the roadway needs a long-term solution.


Two years ago the Town purchased the streetlights from Central Maine Power. Although the Town replaced the lightbulbs with LEDS to save energy, the light fixtures still need replacing as they have exceeded their lifecycle and the Town can no longer procure parts for them. The \$50,000 in funding will allow for a five-year replacement schedule.

Revenues

FY24 nonproperty tax revenues are projected to decrease by (\$96,700) or 2.15%. These types of revenues account for just over 16% of the total budget. The rest is accounted for in property taxes.

In the State of Maine, local governments are dependent on property taxes to fund the majority of local expenses, as the use of local option sales taxes, lodging taxes, etc. are not allowed under state law. Intergovernmental revenue (from the state or federal government), to fund roads, schools, or to provide economic support are modest in Kennebunkport due to the size of our valuation and population.

Staff have reviewed all revenue accounts including, our historical performance over the past few years. The revenues have been adjusted to reflect our best estimates considering current economic activity, the proposed State budget, and recent history. We have increased revenue numbers significantly from our more conservative approach during the pandemic years. This is due to the continued growth in economic activity and State revenue sharing.



Excise tax revenue is rising as the value of vehicles increase and the contribution from this revenue is up by \$50,000. The building permit fees are increasing by \$90,000, while short-term rental accounts are maintaining their current levels. Goose Rocks Beach parking permit fees will increase both in sales as well as individual fee levels contributing an additional \$70,000.

Intergovernmental revenue has increased by almost \$60,900 as the State has returned their contribution from revenue sharing to 5% of sales taxes. This will increase Kennebunkport's share by \$40,000. There is also an anticipated increase of just under \$10,000 in the homestead exemption reimbursement. The State reimburses municipalities 76% of each \$25,000 exemption for residents who qualify for the homestead exemption. The exemption total is then multiplied by the municipal tax rate to determine the value of property taxes "lost" by the exemption.

The largest revenue increase is our investment income account. In one year, we have seen interest rates for our cash balance raise from 1.0% to over 4.0%. This account changes dramatically from year to year depending upon the actions of the Federal Reserve.

In May of 2021, the federal government passed the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), which contained significant funding for state and local governments. Kennebunkport was allocated \$385,600 which was used in the FY23 budget to offset the increased costs of capital. As this was a one-time funding source it is no longer available for FY24.


Over the past eight years, I have recommended a reduction in the use of the Undesignated Fund Balance to offset the tax rate. A Fund Balance contribution toward the budget is deemed "normal" in most circumstances; however, in practice it is counting on savings in the year ahead to balance the budget. The Town did reduce the contribution by \$25,000 each year, and this resulted in moving from a \$300,000 transfer to a \$200,000 transfer. To meet the budget goal of a flat tax rate in FY21, the Town authorized a \$600,000 Fund Balance contribution toward the budget. Over the past two years we have brought this down to \$200,000.

Our Fund Balance Policy requires us to maintain 18%, or a little over 2 months of expenditures available in our General Fund Balance. Each year, as part of the audit process, the Board of Selectmen take action to transfer any additional funds to our Capital Reserve Account. These funds are still available in an emergency; however, they are reserved for future capital projects.

The FY24 budget also contains a transfer from the capital reserve fund balance to assist with the many capital needs proposed in the budget document. The Town was fortunate to bring FY22 to a successful financial conclusion which included reduced expenditures (thanks to the hard work of department directors) and higher than anticipated revenues. This allowed for a transfer in January of 2023, once the audit for FY22 was complete, to the capital reserve account of \$468,351, bringing the balance to \$1.17 million. This transfer was done in accordance with the Town's Fund Balance Policy.

Independent Auditor's Report

Board of Selectmen Town of Kennebunkport, Maine

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine, as of June 30, 2022, and the respective changes in financial position, and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Government Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and schedules related to the pension and OPEB liabilities, as listed in the table of contents, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, is the responsibility of management and although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context.

We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

The combining and individual fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information included in the annual report. The other information comprises the introductory and statistical sections but does not include the basic financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the basic financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon.

In connection with our audit of the basic financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the basic financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 21, 2022 on our consideration of the Town Kennebunkport, Maine's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Town of Kennebunkport, Maine's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

The year 2022 saw much activity in Kennebunkport, not the least of which was to put the COVID-19 pandemic in the rear-view mirror. While we still saw some spikes of the virus throughout the year, we were able to regain a sense of normalcy we have been missing the past several years. We were able to use 2022 to get a number of delayed projects back on track and continue to move forward.

One such project was the completion of the Sales Market Analysis. After being postponed in 2020, we were able to complete it in 2022 thanks to the hard work of staff, especially Becky Nolette, the Town Assessor. The last analysis was completed in 2009, and, as you can imagine, there have been many changes throughout town. The Town's total value rose to over \$3 Billion dollars, and, as a result, the town's mill rate dropped to 6.0 - the lowest in the state among full-service municipalities.

Another project that was on hold for many years was a new Town Hall. Efforts to build a new Town Hall began in 1999 when the Town Hall staff moved into the old fire station at 6 Elm Street. Recently, the Selectboard authorized the Town Manager to form a committee comprised of town staff, board members, and members of the community to study and evaluate the construction of a new Town Hall. The Town continues to grow, and a new town hall is not only necessary to properly house staff, but also to allow us to serve citizens as best we can.

Although it is easy to see the negative effects of the pandemic, as there are many, we have tried to find the positives as well.

Having become adept at hosting remote meetings during the height of COVID-19, the Selectboard voted to implement a hybrid meeting format for many of the Town's Boards and Committees. With this change, we hope to encourage a higher rate of participation from the community and enable anyone who may be unable to attend in person, to still have their voice heard.

Besides the challenges above, we overcame many other hardships. One of them was a lawsuit brought by the RSU21 board challenging the town's ability to recall its elected School Board members by means of a citizens' petition. Another was a completion of a Comprehensive Plan, which was originally planned for 2020.

2022 saw two seats on the Board of Selectmen come to the end of their term. Patrick Briggs, a longtime member of the Board of Selectmen did not seek re-election. Sheila Matthews-Bull, another long-term member, having joined in 2007, sought re-election. Patrick Briggs served on the Board of Selectmen for three terms, from 2013 to 2022. During his tenure, he served as the selectmen representative to the Investment Committee, Planning Board, and the Emergency Management Committee. He has also served as the Town Forester and Tree Warden and is a member of the board of directors for KEMS and the Kennebunkport Heritage Housing Trust. Patrick Briggs was also awarded Kennebunkport's Spirit of America award in 2022 for his volunteer work in the community, particularly with the Kennebunkport Heritage Housing Trust.

Sheila has been on the board for 15 years and has been a resident of Kennebunkport for 30 years. She has been involved with the Kennebunkport Business Association since 1995 and has been a big part of Christmas Prelude ever since. During her terms on the Board of Selectmen, Sheila has been involved with many projects and committees, such as the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Appeals, and the recent Short Term Rental licensing project.

She has worked hard to balance the needs of the residents with the needs of businesses.

John Dykstra was elected to the other available seat. John has served on the Budget Board, the Goose Rocks Beach Advisory Committee, and chaired the Solid Waste/Recycling Committee, bringing curbside recycling back to town. John is also a member of the Cape Porpoise Atlantic Hall Board and the Kennebunkport Conservation Trust. He is also treasurer of the Maine Mineralogical and Geological Society and co-chairs the Island Stewards program.

As life in our small town slowly returned to normal, Kennebunkport continued to move forward. We had a few projects funded through the capital budget including the lease purchase of a new ladder truck, the implementation of the communications radio system and new radio towers, and the replacement of the Wastewater clarifier equipment.

We also had a project funded through a federal grant program: Kennebunkport received grants to replace not only the Cape Porpoise pier but also the causeway leading to Bickford Island. This is an especially important project after the December 23rd storm: a southeast gale blew in from the Gulf of Maine, causing unprecedented flooding in Cape Porpoise, Goose Rocks Beach, and Dock Square. During this time of high-water levels and power outages, Kennebunkport's emergency responders rose to the challenge and made sure that everyone was safe.

The year 2022 presented Kennebunkport with both new challenges and opportunities. Many visitors to our town see its natural beauty as the reason people want to live here. However, to those who call Kennebunkport 'home,' we know that the residents are its greatest asset. In our 369-year history, our town has always come together when necessity requires. Looking forward, I only see this spirit of a community rising and getting stronger.



As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. This past year, our state faced unprecedented challenges, mirroring the difficulties experienced by comm unities across the nation. High inflation rates, a rapidly changing climate, aging infrastructure, and increasing energy costs were among the top concerns I heard while home in the district. Keeping these in mind, I was proud to work with my colleagues in the Maine Delegation to pass historic legislation to bring federal dollars back to our communities.

One of the ways we delivered for Mainers was through the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) in August. This law provides much-needed assistance to struggling families. With the help of the IRA, Americans will save an average of \$800 per year on health insurance and Medicare beneficiaries will have increased access to medication.

It is critically important that we continue to take action to increase job growth, decrease inflation, take measures to promote our national security and invest in our health care and education systems.

Town Manager

It seems we haven't had a "normal" year since 2019, the year prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. With 2020 and 2021 representing the prime years of shutdown, social distancing, and delayed events, 2022 was supposed to be the year we resumed regular operations. In many ways it was. We celebrated public occasions like Prelude and summer concerts without masking and social distance, schools resumed activities and typical classrooms, and we returned to public in-person meetings. However, the COVID pandemic interrupted operations in ways which have not been so quick to return to "normal", these have included the impact to the labor force, challenges in securing supplies and equipment, and the expectation to participate remotely.

According to the US Chamber of Commerce, employers ended up adding an unprecedented 4.5 million jobs in 2022, But at the same time, millions of Americans have been leaving the labor force since before the pandemic. In fact, we have nearly three million fewer Americans participating in the labor force today compared to February of 2020. Kennebunkport and Southern Maine are feeling the same impacts experienced in the rest of America. Our experienced workforce is retiring and there don't seem to be enough workers to fill the vital roles in public service. We hired 16 year-round employees in 2022, replacing those who had retired or sought employment elsewhere. This is an unprecedented recruitment effort for a community our size and I can't thank Yanina Nickless, our Human Resource Manager, enough for her valiant efforts in finding employees with the right set of skills to serve our citizens.

The COVID pandemic negatively impacted the supply chain for equipment and supplies, whether medical or welding, materials needed to be ordered well in advance. We experienced this challenge in our wastewater plant upgrades, ordering generators, securing police cruisers, and even ordering computers. The Police Chief was searching high and low for vehicles to replace our cruisers.

The dealership notified us that a vehicle that had been on order for over a year was cancelled and we could try to order one again in a few months. Thanks to the persistence of the Chief and his willingness to look literally everywhere, we were able to secure the needed vehicles in Massachusetts. Public Works had a similar experience when searching for a new truck and the Board of Selectmen had to authorize our Public Works Director with the ability to expend a certain dollar amount so that when he found a truck he could purchase it on the spot.

The rising cost of equipment prompted the Selectmen to approve a lease purchase for our newest ladder truck. The Town had been reserving funds each year for the eventual replacement of Ladder 34. Unfortunately, the \$1,000,000 in savings did not meet the new truck price of \$1.5 million. The concern that prices were going to continue to outpace our budgeted reserve funds led the Board of Selectmen to enter into a lease purchase for the remaining funds, using our reserves as the down payment. The five year program will require a \$99,000 annual payment, but the budget reserve funds will be reduced to offset that cost.

In-person public meetings returned for all boards and committees in 2022, but with the new hybrid element. The new system, authorized by the State legislature, allows the public, board members, and even employees to participate via electronic programs such as Zoom. This new model allows citizens to have a voice even when they reside elsewhere during the winter and keeps the continuity of the meeting process when COVID-19 spikes in our community.

Building on the climate change goals adopted in 2021, the Town successfully received a State grant in partnership with Biddeford, Kittery, and Kennebunk to develop a climate action plan. The Selectmen appointed a task force to develop specific activities that reduce carbon emissions and vulnerabilities due to climate change.

The Plan will be developed through a community participatory process over a 14-month period. The group will be undertaking a robust public engagement process in 2023 in order to develop a plan that addresses the needs that Kennebunkport citizens identify.

In June, the Town voters approved the architectural and engineering fees to begin designing a new Town Hall. The Town of Kennebunkport has been housed at 6 Elm Street since 1960, or 62 years ago. During that time the Town considered rebuilding Town Hall at another location twice, once in the 1980's with a combined Police Department, and in 1999 with a combined Fire Department. For various reasons the Town did not move forward with a new town hall but renovated 6 Elm Street in 2002. Over the decades the Town has changed, and the Town Hall operations have outgrown the space. The Selectmen have appointed a Town Hall Building Committee which have begun the work of reviewing the programming needs and will bring forward the final concept design for voter consideration.

In the past year, Kennebunkport was awarded over \$5 million in grant funding to tackle two projects in Cape Porpoise. On April 26th, the Town of Kennebunkport was awarded funding in the amount of \$2,663,482. The amount came from two sources. a federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant of \$2,163,482 and a Maine Small Harbor Improvement Program (SHIP) grant of \$500,000. The scope of this project is to reconstruct the Cape Porpoise commercial pier to include widening of portions of the pier, replacement of the bait building with sewer service, installation of 8 floats and gangways, upgrades to electrical service, lighting, and communications, installation of solar panels, replacement and relocation of fuel tanks, and parking improvements. The design phase of the project is expected to be completed in early September. Once approval is gained from the EDA, the project will be placed out to bid. Construction is expected to begin sometime over the winter.

On July 19th, the Town of Kennebunkport was awarded funding in the amount of \$2.585 million. The grants were awarded by the Maine Department of Transportation through the Maine Infrastructure Adaptation Fund. The Fund, first announced by Governor Mills in December 2021, recommendation of the state's climate action plan. Maine Won't Wait, to support community efforts to build climate resilience in Maine. Maine Infrastructure Adaptation Fund recipients will use the funds for projects to address flooding along ocean and riverfronts, protect stormwater and wastewater systems, install culverts to reduce flooding; and ensure energy availability during extreme storms. It is our current intention to raise the causeway four to five feet to maintain access to Bickford Island. This project is currently in the design phase which is expected to be completed this winter. The project will then be placed out to bid after final design.

Assessing

The Assessing Department is responsible for documenting and listing all taxable property, real and personal, within the Town of Kennebunkport. As the Tax Assessor, it is my job to ensure assessments are fair and equitable.

Revaluation

2022 saw the completion of the Market Adjustment project. Revaluations are always a challenging project and as the Town's last revaluation was completed back in 2009, there were considerable changes in assessments throughout the town. I am grateful to all property owners in Kennebunkport for the patience shown throughout the project. I welcomed questions, listened to concerns and hope that I was able to make the process a smooth one. I continue to encourage taxpayers to ask questions as I enjoy explaining how assessing and my job works. Knowledge is key, and though seeing your value increase can be scary, understanding how things work is an important piece of the assessment world.



The 2022 assessed valuation of the Town was \$3,463,221,040. The mill rate decreased from \$9.60 to \$6.00 for the 2022-2023 tax year. The sum of \$20,012,972 was committed to the Tax Collector on July 28, 2022.

LD 290

In August, the State of Maine passed LD 290 a bill to Stabilize Taxes for Senior Citizens. I received over 400 applications, up to the deadline of December 1st. The law promised to freeze residents tax bill for the duration of ownership of their property. With any new law, come a lot of questions and uncertainty, and LD 290 was no exception.

LD 290 posed numerous questions to both municipalities and the legislature regarding implementation, so much so that the legislature is bringing LD 290 back to the drawing board to better streamline and simplify the bill. As I receive updated information from the State, I will pass the information on to the taxpayers of Kennebunkport. I encourage taxpayers to visit our website at kennebunkportme.gov and sign up for e-alerts to informed with what is going in Kennebunkport.



Code Enforcement

Code Enforcement Officers are important local government professionals who play a vital role in keeping the community safe. The department is responsible for the inspection of plumbing and construction and for the enforcement of the Town's Land Use Ordinance.

Building Permits and Project Costs

Building activity in terms of numbers of permits has decreased a bit from last year. What hasn't decreased is the cost of construction, despite the number of permits having decreased.

This number is directly influenced by the continued labor shortage, general inflation, and overall instability in the supply and cost of building materials. It is likely that the decrease in permits is also related to the increased interest rates set by the Federal Reserve in the second half of 2022. Our daily code enforcement activities include examining building plans, issuing permits, performing site inspections, meeting with property owners and representatives on potential projects, responding to zoning complaints, and continued flood map reviews with property owners.


This year, with the passage of the Short-Term rental Ordinance, we now add the review of STR licenses as well as subsequent licensing inspections.

Staffing Changes

Within Code Enforcement we've had some staffing changes. Andrew Welch has departed for a position with Spang Builders doing project management. Taking his place is David Gilchrest who comes to us from the city of Portsmouth, New Hampshire, where he performed plumbing and mechanical inspections. Greg Reid continues to work with us on a part time basis and helps to balance the workload to a more sustainable level. Werner Gilliam meets with many property owners prior to project plan submission and gives guidance on process and submission requirements. April Fortier provides us with excellent admin support and keeps us organized.

Planning & Development

Our department is also responsible for planning and development. This covers a variety of tasks but focuses on preparing for and shaping the future of Kennebunkport.

When writing this report, I always look back at what I wrote the year before and am amazed at what we have done here in Planning and Development. As we transitioned out of the immediate dangers of COVID, we entered into seeing the economic effects that few could have predicted. During the first half of the year we were still experiencing the incredible uptick in construction related activity. As the year progressed, however, the increases in interest rates, skilled labor supply issues, and inflation driven instability caused permit issuance to slow down. We saw this most significantly in new housing starts going from 40 in 2021 to just 14 in 2022. However, construction is not all we do! Here are some notable highlights:

 The Silver Jackets, consisting of a collection of State and Federal partners organized by the Army Corp of Engineers, met with us, and explored practical solutions related to flood risks for property owners in the Dock Square and Lower Village area. The final report has yet to be released.

- With a now approved Short-Term Rental Licensing Ordinance, in partnership with Host Compliance staff, we successfully issued over 400 licenses and diligently worked through the implementation pains of doing our first year of renewals.
- We said goodbye to Eli Rubin who transitioned to South Portland as Community Planner and welcomed Michelle Radley who took his place! Michelle has jumped right into the management of the Short-Term Rental Ordinance and provides staff support to a number of Climate related planning initiatives on which the town is working.
- New for this year is Kennebunkport's participation in the Southern Maine Climate Action Planning Cohort, where the communities of Biddeford, Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Kittery are working together to establish local climate action plans. Climate Action Plans help to lay out policies and programs for reducing communities' greenhouse gas emissions and adapting to climate change.
- We continue our coordinated efforts with other coastal communities regarding floodplain mapping with assistance from Maine's Congressional Delegation. The process of achieving accurate flood plain maps has been a long and technical process that we expect to be bringing to the voters in June 2023.



 With the guidance of the Growth Planning Committee and consultants Tom Morgan and Liz Durfee the town brought forward an updated Comprehensive Plan which was overwhelmingly approved by the voters.



Emergency Management Agency

Emergency management for the past year was a repeat of 2022: we continued to deal with COVID response issues while coordinating with local partners to serve our citizens better. There was a continued effort among the town departments to track and account for supplies used, allowing the town to recover many costs associated with the pandemic. Many hours were spent testing town staff as well as citizens in hopes of keeping services up to levels needed to perform town work.

We also dealt with a number of storms that required all Fire, EMS, Police, and Public Works crews to work together as one team. Storms involving flooding of ocean water are getting more frequent while water levels increase. This increase has brought up much discussion on how town services respond as well as how we can close roads when needed. It is unfortunate, but we spend a large amount of time and effort trying to keep people from going into dangerous areas and, at times requiring unnecessary rescue work. This is why we try to prepare citizens for known weather events and possible flooding.

Preparation is the key to any emergency. Each of us has the responsibility to make sure that you and your family can survive for a few days. This means having a plan, getting supplies together, and watching out for loved ones. Many times, during these large-scale events, we receive numerous phone calls to check on family members or friends. Unfortunately, those calls may need to wait as all responding units are tied up with ongoing emergencies and cannot go right away. If you have a loved one close or far away, take the time now to get them prepared to leave the area or have a secondary method of having them checked on. During many recent storms, cell phone usage was poor, and the internet/power was out, making it difficult to contact loved ones. Plan ahead for everyone's benefit. Should you need assistance in planning for a disaster, we have helpful booklets located at the town hall and the police station for you.

During 2022, as the impact of COVID diminished, we were able to resume our full schedule of training. For the last few years, we have benefitted greatly from having three training sessions per month, one each hosted by the three local departments: Arundel, Kennebunk, and Kennebunkport. These are generally the same training topic for the month, thus giving our members multiple opportunities to attend at least one session. In addition, we often have a fourth session each month on topics unique to our community. Many training sessions are "hands on," such as vehicle extrication, water rescue with our two small rescue boats, and various aspects of structural firefighting.

We also encourage new members to take a full Firefighter 1 and 2 certification course, at least two of which are held in the area each year. These courses are normally held on nights and weekends to accommodate volunteer members who work full time. These courses are approximately 240 hours in duration and are required for those who wish to be qualified to wear air packs and work inside a burning structure.

Two of our recent graduates of these programs were hired in 2022 for career firefighter positions; one in Kennebunk, the other in Portland.

There was a change of watch at the Cape Porpoise Pier this year with Chris Mayo leaving to accept a job with the State. Jon Noyes did an admirable job as Interim Pier Manager and kept things running smoothly through summer and into the fall. At the end of November Frank Orr took on the role of Harbormaster and Pier Manager after 16 years as Assistant Harbormaster in Freeport.

While the staff at the Pier may have changed, the hours of operation will remain the same. The Summer hours will continue to be from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, Tuesday through Saturday.

If you need gasoline or diesel for your vessel, we recommend calling ahead on VHF Channel 16 or by phone at (207) 967-5040 for scheduling.

Cape Porpoise and the coastal waters of Kennebunkport had a good year in 2022. Fuel revenue for 2022 increased by 63% over 2021. Pier Membership was steady, and the commercial fishing fleet was very active.

It was a challenging year for the fishermen working out of Kennebunkport because while the lobster catch was comparable to past years' harvests, the prices fell dramatically in 2022 and operating expenses were significantly higher due to the increased costs of fuel, equipment, and services.

For the new Harbormaster, it has been a busy fall in Cape Porpoise with several significant storms. The most serious of these was a storm on December 23 with strong southeast winds blowing straight into the harbor, and an over six-foot storm surge which peaked during the astronomical high tide. This caused flooding and damage both at the Pier itself and on Pier Road, where the causeway was completely under water. Flooding also extended into the neighborhoods at the top of the harbor and along the waterfront at Goose Rocks Beach.

Looking ahead to 2023, we expect it will be a very busy year in Cape Porpoise. The Pier Renovation Project is scheduled to start in the Fall of 2023. This project includes major renovation of the Pier, the addition of a new ramp and float system for improved water-level access, replacement and relocation of the fuel storage tanks to higher ground on Bickford Island, and significant improvements to the building and facilities. Included in the project plan is the intention to maintain normal services at the Pier during the construction period.

In December, you might have seen the beginning of seaweed harvesting. This winter you will also see activity related to seaweed harvesting that will be performed from now until early spring. This sustainable harvesting of rockweed is being performed by Hale Miller of Tenants Harbor. Over the course of the winter, you'll see his unusual looking boat and large green bags of seaweed floating in the harbor and tied up alongside the Pier. Mr. Miller's activity schedule is driven by the tide cycle, so you can expect to see his vessel underway at any hour of the day or night.

We look forward to a productive 2023 in Cape Porpoise with many positive changes expected for this year. I'm always happy to assist with questions about our working waterfront and am ready to assist with any business at the Pier. My office door is always open (but services here are limited so I recommend bringing your own coffee if you're stopping in for a chat).

Feel free to call, hail me on Channel 16, or flag me down underway once the boat is launched in the Spring.

Kennebunk River Harbormaster

As I reflect on last year, I can't help but look at the storms we had and how it reflects that the location of our small tidal river community is very much on the "lee shore" of this planet's great North Atlantic Ocean. There were nine storms that had winds of over 40 mph. Five of those came with significant snow fall and four came with a significant tidal surge. The river also had nine high tides of over 11 feet. Add the annual rain run-off and the river for all of its shortcomings took her lumps well!

The river water quality improved last year but not on a large scale. To see the current "Kennebunk River Watershed Based Management Plan" please go to this link:

Last spring in March and April, all 25 Commercial Moorings and 37 Recreational Moorings were inspected by Pepperrell Cove Marine Services. The Commercial moorings had a total of five moorings that needed tackle replaced, and the Recreational moorings had 27 moorings that need a variety of tackle replaced. To the Commercial mooring owners' credit, they have been "self-inspecting" on an annual basis for quite some time, and it shows! The recreational mooring owners have responded favorably to the new inspection protocols. My hope is to have mandatory inspections every other year starting next year.

I've found one of the paramount assets to being a harbormaster is that of listening. Taking initiative would be second, but not always. The safety of all those who work, play, visit or live on the river is a very deep concern of mine. Paying attention to the variety of concerns is extremely important to putting into place mechanisms that address those concerns as well as provide for a safer river environment.

The river committee consists of seven resident volunteers from the towns of Kennebunk & Kennebunkport. They are looking for new members, so if interested please contact the town clerk at Kennebunk town hall. These dedicated souls are my guiding light. Without their assistance as well as the two towns' administration my work would be much more difficult.

Thank you all for the support and advice. It's a privilege to serve these communities as their Harbormaster.

Municipal Support

The Municipal Support Department is relatively new to Kennebunkport's government. It is unique by its nature because it consolidates three different branches - human resources, communications, and informational technology. While previously, various employees shared and filled these functions in addition to many other job duties; there was no one dedicated department to combine them under one umbrella. With the complexity of the municipal structure and increasing requests for services, it was time to shape a division that could support other employees. Thus, at the beginning of 2022, the Municipal Support Department saw its existence and included three people. These people are Yanina Nickless. the Special **Projects** Manager/HR Coordinator; Hope Mowry-Wall, the Communications and Events Specialist; and David Powell, the Technology Specialist.

The department filled many needs with one main goal: to support Kennebunkport's staff so they could do the best job possible for the citizens. Throughout 2022, the Municipal Support Department helped Finance with financial reports, the Town Managers office with the Leadership evaluation program, the Parks and Recreation Department with the Chalk the Port festival, the Public Works Department with Public Works Open House event, various other departments with the recruitment and hiring process for over 45 positions (full-time and seasonal), maintaining social media accounts, and much more.

Public Health and Nursing

Two Health Officer complaints were filed and responded to by the Health Officer. The State of Maine legislature mandates that each Health Officer completes a six-hour certification program as well as continuing education through the year. The Health Officer is required to work closely with the Maine CDC to report, monitor, and follow up on treatment and precautions in order to prevent the spread of illness through a community.

Programs & Services

The Public Health Department continues to actively promote programs that focus on improving the health and welfare of our community members. Our service provides skilled nursing care at the public health office as well as in residents' homes.

Outside agencies assist our staff in providing occupational therapy, physical therapy, home IV therapies, and hospice care. These agencies are usually covered by Medicare and private insurances. The nurses made 1,128 home nursing visits and residents made 485 office visits for treatment and consultations in 2022.

Residents are encouraged to visit the nurses during office hours for blood pressure readings, blood sugar evaluations, dressing changes, suture removal, treatments, and consultation. The office provides a variety of free resources and materials regarding disease prevention, health promotion/education, and community events. We would like to remind residents that the Public Health Department has a free durable medical equipment loan closet. This closet is funded by the Health Council and private donations. Available equipment includes wheelchairs, walkers, commodes, toilet seat risers, crutches, canes, and adaptive home equipment. In 2022, residents came by to utilize our medical loan closet 270 times. Stop by before you buy!

The Public Health Department offers many outreach programs, clinics, and educational classes to the community. These offerings are a result of collaboration between the Public Health Department, the Kennebunkport and Kennebunk Police Departments, the Louis T. Graves Memorial Library, Kennebunkport Parks & Recreation, The Center, the University of New England, the Coastal Healthy Community Coalition, local businesses, and residents.

Throughout 2022, we continued to be faced with the challenges of COVID-19 and its many variants causing illness in our community and many others. Community education related to symptoms and prevention were a priority. Many precautions that were put into place during the pandemic have been discontinued. We teamed up with York County Emergency Management to offer community Covid vaccine clinics providing first time, or booster dosing of the Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines. The clinic was well attended, and we were able to offer vaccines to home bound seniors in Kennebunkport.

Well Water Testing

In June 2022, the Public Health Department and Nelson Analytical Lab/Kennebunk sponsored our annual Well Water Testing. This year, due to lab staffing and the continued effects of the pandemic, residents were asked to drop off the well water kits at their leisure between June 1st and 15th to not overwhelm the lab with work. The Public Health Department continues to offer this yearly event. The kits are free and there is a reduced fee for testing for Kennebunkport residents. It is extremely important to have your well water tested every year for a dug well and every 5 years for an artesian well. There are over 1,000 households in Kennebunkport who rely on well water. And along with water goes sewer. The Public Health Department must encourage all residents to take care of your septic tanks with routine maintenance. Septic inspections, pumping septic systems out every 3-5 years, and water conservation is suggested to maintain your system. Many issues can be prevented with routine maintenance. Visit the Public Health website for more information on septic care/education.

Medication Disposal

Residents are reminded not to discard unused prescription and over-the-counter medications in your household trash or sewer/septic systems. Please deposit your medications in the secured box located in the Police Department's lobby. Disposing medications in your septic or sewer system can adversely affect the systems efficiency as well as influence the status of our watersheds. Those who are using sharps such as syringes to treat Diabetes and various illnesses, please bring them to our office for disposal in our Hazardous Waste container or follow these guidelines set by Maine Environmental Protection agency,

www.maine.gov/dep/waste/biomedical/sharps.html. Kennebunkport Public Health and Police Department participated in the drug disposal project "Take Back Your Drugs" sponsored by the Maine Attorney General's Office this past June and October. Watch for it again this coming June 2023. Visit the public health website for more information on medication and hazardous waste disposal.

Maine Healthy Beaches

Kennebunkport participated with the Maine Healthy Beach program again in 2022. Samples were collected at both Goose Rocks Beach and Colony Beach 2 times per week, from Memorial Day through Labor Day monitoring the water quality for bacteria. Please visit

www.mainecoastdata.org/public/CurrentBeachStatus .aspxe (Maine Healthy Beaches) for beach status history along with current conditions of any coastal Maine beach participating in this program. The Goose Rocks Beach watershed was also monitored throughout the spring, summer, and fall. Data collected is to assist with determining bacteria sources for contamination.

This was done in collaboration with Maine Healthy Beaches program at the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. Our efforts will continue this coming season. Information related to our watershed studies can be found on the Public Health website under Maine Healthy Beaches and water quality tab.

General Assistance

The General Assistance Program is a State mandated service required in every municipality in the state of Maine. This program is designed to help individuals and families meet their basic needs including food, housing, fuel & utilities, and medical and dental services. Each town or city designates a General Assistance Administrator who is responsible receiving applications, making decisions concerning an applicant's right to receive assistance, preparing records and communications concerning assistance. In Kennebunkport, the Public Health Director serves as the General Assistance Administrator, As Kennebunkport's GA Administrator, I continue to focus on assisting residents with finding resources that meet the escalating housing, food, and heating costs.

Twelve General Assistance applications were submitted in 2022. Although none of the applicants qualified for assistance through the state, we were able to assist these applicants through our other resources. Kennebunkport General Assistance is audited yearly by the Department of Health and Human Services.

During the winter of 2021-2022 the Kennebunkport Emergency Fuel Program provided for 9 emergency fuel deliveries of 100 gallons and assisted with avoiding 2 CMP disconnects. This program is funded by donations. The Kennebunkport "general needs" account is also funded by donations. It allows us to help residents pay for basic needs if they don't qualify for General Assistance through the State of Maine.

York County is fortunate to have medical and dental services that provide care for those without insurance. Nasson Health Care is a community-based health center with locations in Springvale (15 Oak Street) and Biddeford (357 Elm Street).



Patients may pay for the offered services with flexible payment options and are accepted no matter the type of insurance, whether private insurance or Maine Care, as well as those who are uninsured. The Affordable Care Act continues to enable many of our working residents to have medical coverage.

Food Distribution

Community Outreach Services in Kennebunk is our local food pantry. Since the start of the pandemic COS has changed how they provide food to residents in the community. COS has opened for "neighbors" in need the ability to shop for food at the food pantry for items that they wish for their family. Appointments (online, or by phone) must be made to shop at the pantry. To access this program, residents must contact COS online: coskennebunks.formstack.com/forms/gafoodpantry, or call: 207-604-0445.

This past summer/fall COS started a "food 4 kids" program, providing food for families with kids to help get them through summer break, school vacations and weekends when they couldn't get breakfast/lunch at school. We had 1 family participate in this program. No families from town participated in the York County Shelter food pantry program.

Other Assistance

- Stuff the Backpack project was supported by the Health Council, purchasing 3 back packs and gift cards to staples for school supplies for our school children.
- Secret Santa provided Christmas gifts for 6 Kennebunkport children.
- 10 holiday meal baskets were delivered from Community Outreach services. Community Harvest provided hot holiday meals to the community upon request for Thanksgiving and Christmas.
- There was no Salvation Army activity this past year.
- 7 seniors received special holiday gift bags from the Senior Elves at the Senior Center Lower Village.
- The Sea Coast Garden Club provided 6 box wood trees for our seniors.
- We still collect used cell phones for Shelter Alliance to assist Caring Unlimited. Please leave them at our door, and we will be sure to pass them along to the appropriate agency.
- Kennebunk Rotary's program "CS3" provides clothing for children in need going back to school.
 4 children in our community received back to school clothing.
- We had 4 families participate in a new program "Healthy Harvest". They received a farm share at Frinklepod Farm for fresh produce.

Public Works

The Public Works Department provides snow plowing service for 52 miles of roads plus sidewalks, public parking lots, and other public facilities during the winter. In addition, the Department is also responsible for road repairs, storm drain systems, maintenance, and painting of crosswalks and parking spaces in Town.



The Town Mechanic is responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of all Town vehicles, including the Public Works equipment, Police and Fire vehicles, and the Recreation bus. Other responsibilities include the upkeep of the Public Works Department facility and the Town's tank farm.

The Public Works Department saw a few changes in 2022. The restructuring of the Public Works Department left a vacant position for Operations Manager, which was filled by the longtime operator Rick Merrill. Unfortunately, we lost another longtime operator, Scott Lantagne, to retirement. Scott was with the Public Works Department for 25 years and still actively serves on the Fire Department. We miss his dedication and experience but managed to convince him to stay on as a backup plow operator. Thank you, Scott! We hope you are enjoying retirement!

The Public Works Department had many accomplishments throughout the year. In addition to maintenance of all the roads and beaches, here are a few of the highlights:

In the spring, the Public Works Department and Wastewater Department hosted the first-ever Kennebunkport Public Works Open House during National Public Works Week on May 21. The departments worked with the Parks and Recreation Department, the Fire Department, the Solid Waste and Recycling Committee, the Planning Department, and Maine Clean Communities. This event allowed us to share the equipment, talent, and services offered by our departments.

Throughout the course of the summer, the Public Works Department completed initial tree removal, ditching, and drainage repairs ahead of paving operations. Roads paved and/or reconstructed this year included part of Beachwood Avenue, Old Cape Road, South Main Street, Pearl Street, and Elm Street. The crew also completed the shouldering work, with assistance from Kennebunk Public Works, in needed areas after the roads were paved. Many thanks to Kennebunk Public Works for supplying the shouldering machine and operator!



In the fall, the Public Works Department prepared and erected the temporary ice rink for the Parks & Recreational Department.

Also, Public Works and Robert Zuke Builders found, cut, and erected the Dock Square Christmas Tree for Kennebunkport's annual Prelude celebration. Thank you to Robert Zuke Builders and the Prelude Volunteers for all the work done preparing Dock Square and Cape Porpoise Square for the tree lights and decorations for Christmas Prelude.

Town Clerk

The Town Clerk's Office continued adapting in 2022 as the world around us continues to change. Whether it is online offerings or communication methods, we work to meet our residents' and taxpayers' needs as efficiently and effectively as possible.

I must thank the Clerk's staff, Audrey Williamson, Rose Wills and Becky Nolette. They work diligently to serve our current residents while welcoming the continued influx of new year-round residents. Fun fact, between the four of us, we have 68 years of experience with all things clerky!

The following is a summary of the 2022 town meetings and elections:

May 16, 2022 - R.S.U. #21 District Budget Meeting

We voted on the school budget in a two-step process as required by the school consolidation law. The first step is to vote on the various segments of the budget at a district-wide meeting of Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Arundel voters. The meeting was held at Kennebunk Elementary School at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of approving the 2022/2023 school budget. The total budget proposed was \$54,148,467. All articles were approved as written in the Warrant.

June 14, 2022 - R.S.U. #21 Budget Validation

The second part of the school budget process is the Budget Validation election. Kennebunkport, Kennebunk and Arundel each held elections at our own town polling places to approve the budget that was adopted at the district budget meeting. In Kennebunkport there were 1,005 ballots cast either in person or by absentee ballot. The budget passed in all three towns.

June 14, 2022 - Annual Town Meeting

The first half of our Annual Town Meeting is a secret ballot vote to elect our Town officials and to vote on any referendum questions that the Selectmen propose. This year there were two seats for Board of Selectmen and one R.S.U. #21 Director seat open. Sheila Matthews-Bull and Jon Dykstra won the seats on the Board of Selectmen, each with a term of three years. Jameson Spang Davis ran unopposed for the R.S.U. #21 Director's seat, with a term of three years. There were 1,005 votes cast either in person or by absentee ballot.

June 18, 2022 - Continuation of Annual Town Meeting

On Saturday morning at 9:00 a.m. at Consolidated School, voters reconvened to vote on the 2022/2023 Town budget. We welcomed a new Moderator, E. Russell Grady. Mr. Grady did a wonderful job moderating the Town Meeting. All articles were approved as written in the Warrant.

June 14, 2022 – State Primary and Special Referendum Election

The State of Maine held a primary election for Governor, United States Senator, Representative to Congress, State Senator, Representative to the Legislature, York County Sheriff and County Commissioner. There were 849 votes cast either in person or by absentee ballot.



September 22, 2022 - Special Town Meeting

This was a special town meeting to vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute a 20-year first priority mortgage lien on the Cape Porpoise Pier property in favor of the Federal Economic Development Administration as required for the Cape Porpoise Pier reconstruction project. There were 134 registered voters in attendance and the warrant article was approved as written.

November 8, 2022- Special Town Meeting

There were five ordinance questions, all of which passed. There were 2,406 votes cast either in person or by absentee ballot.

November 8, 2022 – State of Maine Gubernatorial Election

There were 2,428 total votes cast for this busy election! Kennebunkport voters elected Janet Mills (D) for Governor. Chellie Pingree (D) was chosen for Representative to Congress. Joseph Rafferty (D) was chosen as State Senator. Traci Gere (D) was chosen for Representative to the Legislature. Bobby J. Mills (D) was elected as County Treasurer. Nancy Hammond (D) was elected as York County Register of Deeds. William King, Jr. was elected as York County Sheriff. Kathryn Slattery (D) was elected as York County District Attorney. Richard Dutremble (D) was elected as York County Commissioner.

Thank you to Claire Julian, who served as Warden for our elections. She worked tirelessly to meet the ever-changing election law requirements. The ballot clerks deserve a special thank you. This year Anne Marie Briggs, Leslie Cargill, Carol Cook, Susanne Cayford, Doug Dicey, Jan Dicey, Connie Dykstra, Jane Evelyn, MaryJane Grant, Ki Leffler, Scott Nolette, Karen Schlegel, Richard Smith and Michael West all gave their time to work at the polls or assist with absentee ballot processing. They are loyal and dedicated citizens of the town, and we owe them a debt of gratitude for their service on election days.

And now the statistics for 2022... We issued 83 marriage licenses, 601 certified copies of vital records, and 19 burial permits. There were 37 recorded deaths and 21 recorded births, of which there were 6 boys 15 girls. We issued 850 dog licenses, 27 annual and 52 daily liquor licenses, 23 special amusement permits, 58 victualers licenses, 14 15 special event permits, non-resident recreational clam licenses, 80 resident recreational clam licenses, 2 trolley permits, and many hunting and fishing licenses. We also processed thousands of Dock Square Parking Lot Vouchers and 3,709 Goose Rocks Beach parking stickers. In addition, we also processed over 7,000 tax payments, registered thousands of cars as well as 380 boats, 64 snowmobiles and 43 ATVs.



Wastewater

It has been a busy year for the Wastewater Department, as we are continuing to advance the three projects approved for funding in June 2021. These include:

- Secondary clarifier's structural/mechanical systems
- Upgrade the sludge dewatering (necessary to meet regulatory requirements)
- Replace three major pump stations: Cape Porpoise, Paddy Creek, and Wildes District pump stations

Clarifier Upgrades

The clarifier mechanisms and roof upgrades were completed in May of 2022. The mechanisms are working well.

Dewatering of Biosolids

In Spring of 2022, the State legislature passed legislation outlawing municipalities rights to distribute compost due to concerns with Per- and Polyfluorinated Substances (PFAS). PFAS are used in a variety of household products and clothing and are also known as "forever chemicals" due to their high resistance to degradation. While the Town has no industrial sewer customers, PFAS was found in our biosolids in low concentrations. Therefore, we cannot currently dispose of our compost. An upgrade to the dewatering equipment should allow us to adequately reduce the amount of PFAS.

We are continuing to compost until we can upgrade the dewatering equipment. The compost is being stored and will be disposed of at a licensed landfill. Performance measures were developed for the dewatering equipment upgrades and bids were developed and advertised. Three centrifuge manufacturers submitted bids with life cycle costs. GEA Westfalia was selected as they met the performance standards and will have the lowest life cycle cost. Two centrifuges were ordered and are being manufactured.

Pump Station Upgrades

Bids were developed and advertised for three pump stations: Cape Porpoise, Paddy Creek and Wildes District. After all bids were reviewed, the contract was awarded to Apex Construction. Work is expected to begin in February of 2023 and be completed by February 2024.


Public Works Open House


Wastewater Treatment

In 2022, the wastewater treatment plant processed a total of 122,505,000 gallons of wastewater. The wastewater treatment process generated a total of 1,967,160 gallons of biosolids that was turned into 1,200 yards of compost. Just for comparison, here are the numbers for recent past years:

Goose Rocks Beach Advisory Committee

The Goose Rocks Beach Advisory Committee was created 10 years ago, pursuant to an ordinance that voters overwhelmingly approved in June 2012. The committee is comprised of 7 elected representatives and one selected by the Selectboard. The purpose of the committee is to consider, propose and review regulations and article changes, to advise on related matters governing the use of the beach by all persons, and to perform other duties as described in the ordinance.

The committee had a busy and productive 2022. Our greatest challenges – sustaining the traditional use of the beach amid ever-growing demands on limited beach space, even as we begin to face up to the reality of a changing environment with sea level rise, storm intensification, and frequency. Many are aware that at high tides, there is no longer a dry beach in front of some rock walls.

One of the committee's top priorities was to preserve and enhance the beach's natural features. Our goal is to do what can and should be done to sustain the overall health of the beach and make the experience of visitors as positive as it can be. We partner with other town stakeholders and others to amplify our efforts. Those efforts included:

- Staking and installing twine from Dinghy Point eastward to past Jeffries Way to support dune grass and dune growth.
- Annual installation of kayak racks to keep the boats out of the dunes on land owned by the Kennebunkport Conservation Trust.
- Regular mapping of dunes by drone flights to create a database and visual imagery to guide future beach preservation efforts.
- Financial support to the Maine Geological Survey's Beach Profiling program, which would not exist without the great work of a group of year-round residents of Goose Rocks Beach.


- Our Natural Resources sub-committees continued support for the town's participation in the State's Healthy Beaches Program, which, thanks to town staff, volunteers, and citizen scientists from Goose Rocks Beach, are monitoring and investigating continuing water quality issues that come from the rivers at either end of the beach.
- Annual spring beach cleanup day.

Other 2022 Initiatives:

- Traffic Safety responding to various traffic and road safety concerns, our sub-committee worked with the Police Department to monitor traffic flow and speeds. Conclusions: heavy traffic is a reality, more than 24,000 vehicles a day on Dyke Road and 8,000 on New Biddeford Road during the August test period. A surprising (but maybe not to residents in the west end) 9,000 vehicles on Kings Highway in that neighborhood. And slower vehicle speeds than claimed at 4 test locations, with only 1% of vehicles clocking an enforceable speed violation. Also, a request from the committee led to the striping of the west end of Kings Highway in an attempt to slow vehicular speed.
- Committee members also regularly work with the town and with beach users over various enforcement or safety issues that are brought to individual committee members' attention (dogs off-leash, dead seals, overnight gear storage).
- The committee organized two educational programs over the summer to educate visitors and residents. This summer's topics were The Importance and Protection of Salt Marshes, a talk by Professor Pam Morgan, and Lobstering in the Gulf of Maine led by Cape Porpoise lobsterman Ed Hutchins.

- We provided regular updates at our meetings on the status of plover and least tern protection efforts. BAC member Carol Sherman is our liaison with the town, Maine Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, and Maine Audubon to protect threatened and endangered species. Maine Audubon, which manages the statewide project, reported that GRB had 24 fledged plover chicks in 2022, the state had a total of 252. Unfortunately, we had no nesting of least terns, and the state's total was reduced to only 40 fledglings.
- Finally, we began to focus on the unintended consequence of having installed kayak racks on the beach the racks are so popular that the number of kayaks left on the beach seems to be doubling each year. With limited beach space for visitors and locals in the eastern arc of the beach, particularly on weekends with middle-of-the-day high tides, we began to explore options to manage the competing interests of sunbathers and boat owners.

Budget Board

Budget season is a time for the Board of Selectmen, the Budget Board, the Town Manager, the Department Heads, and the residents to discuss and analyze the priorities of our town. We look at providing the services our residents value and maintaining our buildings and infrastructure while planning for the town's future needs.

The increase in expenses this year is primarily driven by increases in fuel costs, an additional request by KEMS, vehicle repairs, maintenance of the 12 buildings/facilities that the town owns, landfill monitoring, wages, capital expenses, and debt. Nonproperty tax revenue was also expected to increase. The difference between the two is made up of property taxes. This is how the tax rate is set. We also had a revaluation done this year. The town valuation was increased by this market analysis which caused the tax rate to decrease. When all was said and done, the mill rate was set at \$6.00, the lowest in York County.

The Budget Board comprises of 12 members who represent all sections of Kennebunkport. Since the Town Moderator appoints us, we are entirely independent from the Board of Selectmen. This allows us to review the budget and make recommendations that will provide for the town's needs while keeping the tax rate as low as possible without any outside influences or politics.

For those citizens unfamiliar with the annual budget process, each Thursday in March, the Budget Board meets jointly with the Board of Selectmen to hear presentations by the Town Manager, the Town's Department Directors, boards and committees, and non-profit organizations. All these meetings are televised and can be viewed by the public, and all the meetings are open to the public.

After all the presentations are heard, each Board meets separately to review the requests and make recommendations. Should there be any disagreement between the Boards, a final meeting with both Boards is held.

The recommendations of each Board are incorporated into the Town Meeting Warrant to be voted by the Town's registered voters at the Annual Town Meeting. This process is in keeping with the longstanding New England custom and gives the Town voters confidence that all recommendations have been thoroughly reviewed. Should a Special Town Meeting be held involving any request for funds, again, both Boards meet to review and recommend the request.

As always, the Budget Board wishes to express our appreciation to all town employees, Department Heads, the Town Manager, and the Board of Selectmen for their commitment and dedication to the residents of the Town of Kennebunkport.

Our Annual Town Meeting to vote on the budget and any other necessary town business is the second Saturday in June at 9 AM. It is the purest form of local government. We hope to see you there.

This year we will be replacing a headstone in the Perkins Cemetery. This cemetery was open to the public last summer during the garden tour sponsored by the Graves Library. Many of the cemeteries in town are not seen by the public because they are on private property. The descendants of those buried there have the right to access the cemetery. Of course, the landowner needs to be made aware, whether you are a descendant or not.

We reviewed and revised information for the Comprehensive Plan. You can access this plan at Graves library – a great read covering all aspects of the town.

Research was done on the Stone Haven Hill Cemetery. There seemed to have been two cemeteries in that area – the Brown family and Mr. John Walker. Neither of these cemeteries remain there. The Brown headstones were moved to the Arundel Cemetery.

Major cleanup was done on the William and James Jeffrey Cemeteries off of Route 9. They are actually two cemeteries right next to each other of two brothers and their families. Turns out that in Kennebunkport there are five Jeffrey cemeteries – James, William, Isaac, Emmons Jeffrey and Eleazer. Work was done by committee members, volunteers and a high schooler getting community service hours.

Climate Action Planning Task Force

Kennebunkport is creating a Climate Action Plan through the SMPDC's Climate Action Planning Cohort – a group of southern Maine communities coordinating climate planning efforts. The group is composed of Kennebunkport, Kennebunk, Biddeford, and Kittery.

Southern Maine's Climate Action Planning Cohort is by SMPDC in partnership with Governments for Sustainability (ICLEI) and Morris Communications. The CAP Cohort is a year-long, community-driven process that will generate local climate action plans developed through a robust planning and public engagement process with each of the four participating southern Maine communities. Additionally, each participating community has a Task Force of dedicated volunteers, subject matter experts, and municipal staff that are tasked with overseeing the climate action planning process and inviting public engagement, that will lead to the development of a climate action plan.

Conservation Commission

In 2022 the Kennebunkport Conservation Commission continued its mission to serve as a research, advisory, and advocacy group on environmental and conservation issues related to the Town of Kennebunkport. Below is an overview of focus areas and results in 2022.

Invasives Removal Demonstration Project

In June, as part of a dune preservation and invasive plants management program, a gathering of volunteers removed invasives (mostly bittersweet and bush honeysuckle) from the entrance to Goose Rocks Beach at the intersection of Dyke Road and Kings Highway. As a demonstration project, the work was in a highly visible area and prompted many conversations about the identification and removal of tree-damaging invasives, such as bittersweet. A large number of lilacs are thriving where the invasive plants were removed.



Grant Award

The Commission was awarded a grant in the amount of \$28,611.00 through the Maine Coastal and Marine Climate Action Fund to continue the program just mentioned. The grant will fund dune restoration – replanting of native dune grass at Goose Rocks Beach – as well as public education on dune restoration and invasive plant management.

Healthy Ecosystem Survey

In spring, the Commission issued a town survey to understand better the community's opinions on the use of pesticides and fertilizers; a concern earlier identified in the town's 2018 survey. The Commission received 656 responses, and again, results indicated ongoing concern about the use of synthetic pesticides and fertilizers in our town. A compelling 85% had "lots or some concern" about the effects that pesticide use is having on air and water quality, human health, pollinators, or general ecological health. About the level of action the town should take, 72% wanted the town to take "some" or "a lot" of action to protect water, pollinators, and the environment. Healthy Ecosystem Ordinance and Public Education

Based upon extensive research and as a result of the Healthy Ecosystem Survey results, the Commission put forward to the Board of Selectmen a draft Healthy Ecosystem Ordinance. After discussion, it became clear that there was a need for town staff (Werner Gilliam, Director of Planning and Development) to be more involved throughout the process and in the language and structure of an ordinance. This process continues, and the Commission continues to refine ordinance language while stepping up public education on healthier methods of lawn and garden maintenance. Steven Hanna, Ph.D., has written A Rationale for a Healthy Ecosystem Ordinance for Outside Pesticide and Fertilizer Regulations. This document will be a part of a multi-faceted education effort for town staff, the Board of Selectmen, and residents in 2023.

Connection with Regional Collaborators

As part of a multi-group approach to conservation, the Commission met with members of the Kennebunk Conservation Commission and the Southern Maine Planeteers to plan for jointly sponsored educational events and related projects. With Kennebunk and Arundel, the Commission is also a member of the Kennebunk River Restoration Committee, working to create awareness and action around the February 2021 Kennebunk River Watershed-based Management Plan.

Other Activity

Other Activities from 2022 included:

- Completed research into the treatment of town parks and town school property
- Added comprehensive educational materials to the website
- Monitored King Tide events to illustrate the "sunny day flooding" along town areas

Growth Planning Committee

In 2022, the Growth Planning Committee (GPC) completed its work on updating the Kennebunkport Comprehensive Plan. The plan was approved on November 8, 2022, by 79% of the Town's voters who took part in the election. On behalf of the members of the GPC, the Town of Kennebunkport Planning and Code Enforcement Department, and our planning consultants on this project, Thomas Morgan of TMZ Planning and Liz Durfee from EF Design & Planning, I would like to thank all of you that voted and all of you that participated in this four-year effort to update and modernize our Town's Comprehensive Plan.

When we set out to update the Plan, we identified key aspects which needed to be achieved. We first needed to modernize the Plan to make it a more readable and engaging document. Secondly, we needed a working summary of the Plan and its key strategies to make it more useful. Finally, we wanted to ensure that all the Departments, Boards, and Committees charged with implementing the strategies had the opportunity to review and agree to them prior to the approval of the Plan. We successfully met these objectives in the Plan that you approved.

In March of 2022, Jim Fitzgerald stepped down from the GPC. We were saddened to hear of his passing in December of last year. Jim was dedicated to his service as Vice Chair of the Committee. He could always be counted on to provide the right guidance when we were at an impasse on a subject being debated. His thoughtful insight and commitment to the Town of Kennebunkport will surely be missed. I would like to thank each member of the GPC for their work and perseverance during the past year. They actively engaged on each topic, always debated respectively, and had the willingness to reach a compromise to move the project forward.

I would like to thank Liz Durfee and Tom Morgan for their excellent work and flexibility in meeting our revised schedule due to the Pandemic. I would also like to thank Eli Rubin for his quality work coordinating the review of the strategies with the Town's Department, Boards, and Committees to get their agreement on each. We are also looking forward to working with Michelle Radley, who will be instrumental in helping all to achieve the Plan's goals. Finally, I would like to thank Werner Gilliam for his continued guidance. This is the second version of the Plan that I have had the pleasure to work with Werner on, and neither would have been successful without his leadership.

Lighting Committee

We see our mission as preserving the night sky for residents, visitors, and future generations in Kennebunkport.

2022 was the second year that the Town has owned all of the streetlights in town, purchased from Central Maine Power. This is in keeping with the Town's objective to be mindful of our energy usage. The Town is saving a lot of money and this is a first step in meeting one part of the climate change goals of the town.

You can help the town reduce energy and preserve the night sky by turning off your safety, security, or esthetic lights at your residence when you are away or asleep.

Leaving lights on all night can be a perceived convenience to you but an intrusion for your neighbor. The exception to this is if you fly the American flag all night; then it is to be illuminated. (Title 4, Chapter 1, Section #6 (a) "It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open. However, when a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.")

Due to the age and style of the existing platter radial wave lights, replacement parts are not available. We have not yet removed evaluation test fixtures for future upgrades since parts are non-existent for our existing incandescent platter lights.

The two test fixtures from Holophane Lighting have received the most positive feedback regarding their dimensions, esthetics, and performance. The light at Temple Street needs to have its optics changed so that less light is on the abutting properties.

The test fixtures are located as follows:


 Temple Street - CMP Pole 4 Corner of Temple and Spring Street

The Town has digital mapping of all streetlights in Kennebunkport. This gives the residents of the Town, the Lighting Committee, and the Public Works department easier access to determine the future of streetlights in town, including discovering lights on private property or lights that are serving private landowners rather than on more traveled streets in Town.



To access this map, open your browser to the Town website – https://www.kennebunkportme.gov. Select "Departments", then "Public Works Department". On the left side menu, select "Street Lights in Kennebunkport". A map appears with all of the lights marked on the map.

The layers list on the right provides a legend for the symbols on the map. For example, squares (indicating Town of Kennebunkport owned fixture) with a green dot in the middle are the original platter radial wave lights, some dating back to 1947. Click on the symbol and a lot of information for that fixture appears on your screen including, in some cases, photos of the fixture and pole. We are in the process of proofing the information to be sure it is accurate. Notes are added when there are changes or problems to track in the future.

To report a street light that is out or needs repair, select "Street Light" on the "Public Works Department" web page. Scroll to the bottom of this page for the Public Works phone number. It is helpful to have the nearest street address and pole number for reference.

If there are any questions regarding street lights, please give our committee a call for assistance.

The Lighting Committee recognizes that the code as written is in need of update due to LED technology.

Anyone interested in our night environment in town is encouraged to join the Lighting Committee.

Planning Board

Since April, we have held meetings at the Fire Station, with Zoom participation also enabled. It is a relief to finally have the board together in person.

The Trolley Museum had two applications approved before the board. They are installing a building to house a beautiful model railroad, which was donated to the museum. They are also replacing and improving one of their car barns.

The other major project reviewed and approved was an extensive revision to the Cape Porpoise Pier, funded by the Federal Government.

Three subdivisions reviewed over the year are still in the review process: The Glen at Goose Rocks, Woodland Drive, and Mills Road Subdivision. Other developments were modified to add or change lots. Three changes to driveways or walkways also were reviewed and approved. In addition, six non-conforming houses were approved for renovations to make them less non-conforming, including one with a dock, which was the only dock project this year.

We also granted Hidden Pond a change from seasonal to year-round use operation of several cottages, the event barn, and the spa. We allowed Nunan's Lobster Hut to utilize a portion of their parking lot to provide outside picnic tables as they had during the pandemic.

During this year, the Planning Board also met with the Town Planner to discuss the Comprehensive Plan and with the Kennebunkport Conservation Commission to discuss potential changes to pesticide use ordinances.

The board has five regular members and two alternate members. A quorum of three members (regular or alternate) is required for meetings. The membership of the board changed in 2022: Nina Pearlmutter, Vice Chair, Scott Mahoney, Ed Francis, and Larry Simmons, as well as alternate George Lichte. John Harcourt resigned as an alternate, and he was replaced by Mike West.

Solid Waste Committee



The Solid Waste/Recycling Committee was organized at the direction of the Board of Selectmen in June of 2019 to investigate the feasibility, and associated costs, of re-establishing a publicly funded recycling program in Kennebunkport.

In January of 2021 curbside recycling returned to Kennebunkport. Bi-weekly curbside collection is currently being performed by Casella, and ecomaine (https://www.ecomaine.org) is contracted to do the processing.

Kennebunkport residents have done an admirable job of keeping contamination out of our recycling stream. During 2022, the Town was charged a contamination fee only once, and that was during one of the summer (tourist-influenced) months. Other than that month, our recycling has met ecomaine's standards. The global economics of recycling have improved. The Town's contract with ecomaine provides a provision that allows a financial return to the Town proportional to ecomaine's net profits. This year, that return was \$31,000, largely off-setting the Town's 2022 recycling contract cost with ecomaine of just over \$40,000.

During 2022 the Committee members supported recycling education during two Town events: the March 21st Public Works Open House and the September 23rd-24th Chalk the Port event.

A significant Committee accomplishment this year was leading the Town in establishing an agreement with Apparel Impact (https://www.apparelimpact.com) to host collection bins for textile/apparel reuse and recycling. We currently have four collection bins, three at the Police Station at 101 Main Street, and one at the Town Fire Station at 32 North Street.

Shade Tree Committee

Kennebunkport's tree canopy is not only beautiful, but it is also essential to the health and prosperity of the community. Trees benefit humans and communities in crucial and tangible ways. Here are some of those ways:

Trees combat climate change. In one year, an acre of mature trees absorbs the same amount of CO2 equal to the CO2 produced when driving a car 26,000 miles.

Trees clean the air. They absorb odors and pollutant gases (nitrogen oxides, ammonia, sulfur dioxide and ozone) and filter out particulates.

Trees provide oxygen. In one year, an acre of mature trees provide enough oxygen for 18 people.

Trees cool streets and communities. Trees cool communities by up to 10°F by shading streets and homes and releasing water vapor through their leaves.

Trees conserve energy. Trees planted strategically around a one-family home can reduce summer air-conditioning by 50 percent. And this also reduces the CO2 released by energy produced by power plants.

Trees save water. Trees slow evaporation of water from thirsty lawns. Newly Planted trees need 15 gallons of water each week. Through transpiration, tree leaves add significant moisture to the atmosphere.

Trees help with water pollution. By breaking up rainfall, trees direct water down their trunks and filter it through their leaves. Trees prevent stormwater runoff into rivers and the ocean.

Trees help prevent soil erosion. On stream banks and along shorelines, trees slow runoff and keep soil in place.

Trees add to home values. Surveys show that mature trees on a well-landscaped property increase the value of homes by seven to 20 percent.



The Shade Tree Committee strives to preserve the Town's tree canopy. It has planted approximately thirty trees in the last two years: nine elms, five maples and 17 chestnut saplings. Again this year, scores of elms and many ash trees were treated to help minimize the impact of Dutch Elm Disease and Emerald Ash Borer. Since the beginning of the fiscal year in July 2022, the Shade Tree Committee (STC) has expended \$27,708.86 on the maintenance of the Town's trees.

The STC filed its final report for the state 2021 Project Canopy grant of \$6,000 for planting trees. The Town finished its work on improving the Ocean-Union "island." The STC produced a village Tree Walk brochure and distributed approximately 100 of them to hotels in Town. The committee also reviewed and updated the Town's tree practices and policy statement. These changes will need to be approved by the Board of Selectmen at a later date.

Kennebunk, Kennbunkport & Wells Water District



The Kennebunk, Kennebunkport and Wells Water District is a non-profit, quasi-municipal public water utility that was established in 1921 by an act of the Maine State Legislature. The Water District serves an area that encompasses the Towns of Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Wells, Ogunquit, Arundel and small portions of Biddeford and York. The area includes a population which varies seasonally from about 30,000 to over 100,000. It is directed by a four-member Board of Trustees, one elected from each of the towns of Kennebunk, Kennebunkport, Wells and Ogunquit.

2022 was a record-breaking year for the District with regard to both water production and revenue generated. Compared with 2021, 2022 saw a 6.1% increase in water production and a 5.0% increase in total revenue, which included a 6.4% increase in metered revenue. The record-breaking 1,187.7 million gallons (MG) produced in 2022 exceeded the previous record of 1,124.8MG set in 2016 (now 2nd highest) by 5.4%, as well as the 1,119.3MG produced in 2021 (now 3rd highest all time). The significant drought experienced in June, July and most of August, along with customer growth are attributed to this new record water production.

From a financial perspective, we received \$8.794 million in total revenue, which included \$7.291 million in metered revenue as compared to \$8.370 million in total revenues (\$6.854 million in metered revenue), in 2021. All of this contributed to a projected (unaudited) net income for 2022 of approximately \$95,000, as compared to a net income of \$421,426 in 2021.

Overall, the primary drivers for water production and revenues are related to weather conditions during the warmer months as well as long-term customer growth. As noted above, the significant drought experienced during June, July and most of August further enhanced the normally high seasonal summertime demand. This record water production required the District to use its entire portfolio of water supply sources, which included surface water (712.48MG – 60.0%), groundwater (400.88MG – 333.7%) and utility interconnections (74.34MG – 6.3%).

Precipitation (liquid equivalent) during 2022, as measured at our Branch Brook Filtration Plant, finished the year substantially below average at 46.03" (the 18-year running average is 54.19"), which was ranked fourth driest over the last 18 years, which ranged from a low of 41.25" (2015) to a high of 69.42" ((2008). The combined precipitation for May, June, July and August totaled just 12.13" compared with the 18-year group average of 17.12".

Despite the cooling real estate market, customer growth remained strong with a net increase of 88 customers added in 2022. This compares with 153 customers added in 2021 and 133 in 2020, resulting in a continued customer growth rate of about 1%. Our customer base now stands at 14,498 metered accounts, ranking us as the third largest water utility in Maine.

The District's commitment to safety continues to be recognized by our Worker's Compensation insurance carrier (MEMIC) and by the Maine Department of Labor.

For 2022 we once again achieved the lowest "experience modification factor" (Mod Factor) that MEMIC has seen for a water utility. The Mod Factor, which measures the actual worker's compensation claim history of an employer, directly affects the insurance premium paid by that employer.

For us, the Mod Factor of 0.59 (same as 2021, 2020 and 2019 and down slightly from 0.60 in 2018 and 0.61 in 2017) will result in our worker's compensation insurance premium being reduced to 59% of the "standard industry average" amount. In addition to this premium deduction, the District received a \$2,941.65 dividend in 2022 which brings the dividend total to \$28,633.86 since 2016. The District was also successful renewing its SHAPE (Safety and Health Award for Public Employers) certification in 2022, making this our fifth consecutive renewal since receiving our first SHAPE certification award in 2009.

As reported in previous annual reports, the District discovered trace amounts of perfluorinated compounds (PFAS) in its Kennebunk River Well supply and even though the levels were below EPA health advisory levels, we stopped using water from that location to get a better understanding of this newly identified contaminant. We initially performed pilot studies to evaluate treatment technologies for removing PFAS. In June of 2018 we introduced and went online with a full-scale pilot study which achieved great results removing PFAS using pressurized granular activated carbon (GAC) Finally, in June of 2020, the new filtration. permanent PFAS removal facility went online and has been performing very well, treating 450.5MG of water through March 2nd when with PFAS removal facility was shut down in order to replace the filtration media. The detectable level of PFAS in the finished water entering the distribution at the time of shutdown was 11.30ppt (parts per trillion).

This was approximately 57% of the 20ppt level allowed in public drinking water by the State of Maine. The media replacement, which was approved by the Maine Drinking Water Program (DWP), included new virgin GAC (\$38,860) in the lead pressure filter (Filter #1) and CalRes resin (\$162,340) in the lag pressure filter (Filter #2). Although significantly more expensive than the GAC, the District opted to utilize resin in the lag pressure filter given its estimated ability to filter four times the volume of water as well as maintain undetectable levels of PFAS in the finished water significantly longer than GAC media.

In addition, the District had the good fortune of receiving a \$165,000 media replacement grant from the DWP in recognition of the progressive manner in which the District has remediated the PFAS contamination and the wealth of knowledge it has shared with regulators, consultants and other utilities who are dealing with PFAS contamination. Following the media replacement, the PFAS removal facility was restarted on June 30th.

The District is pleased to report that it completed the converting of all its customers' water meters over to Automated Meterina Infrastructure the (AMI) technology platform this past July. The District began installing AMI meters in December 2015 using its own staff and as of this past July had completed 14,614 conversions. Using District staff not only saved money, but allowed for positive customer interaction as well as the ability to document the material type used on the privately-owned portion of the service line that enters the customers building. The AMI technology uses a very small, low-powered radio to transmit the water consumption data directly to our office on a daily basis. The radio is powered by a D-cell sized lithium ion battery which has an expected life of 20 years.

The AMI meters are capable of detecting abnormal water usage patterns, such as leaky plumbing, that has allowed the District to provide timely alerts to many customers. Prior to AMI, customer notification of leaky plumbing could only occur following the quarterly reading, which often lead to high water bills as well as property damage.

The District continues an aggressive water main replacement program based on evaluations of pipe material, condition, age, break history, hydraulic capacity, water quality, and potential system growth. In addition, we make every effort to coordinate with other State and local roadway projects to minimize disruption and pavement costs. We are pleased to report that for the past 29 years, the District has averaged replacing 0.86% of its distribution system per year. This is close to the desired water industry "gold standard" of 1% per year, based upon an expected 100-year useful life for water mains. Very few other water utilities have maintained such an aggressive (yet appropriate) water main replacement schedule.

We have accomplished this task while keeping water rates below that of the average Maine water utility.

The following is a partial list of distribution projects funded by the District and installed by our construction team during 2022.

- Avenue Colony and Ocean Avenue, Kennebunkport: Replaced ~1,343 feet of obsolete 8-inch cast iron pipe with new 12-inch PVC pipe in conjunction with the Colony Hotel's major renovation and expansion project. The new larger main enhances hydraulic capacity and system reliability in this high demand coastal location.
- Warrens Way, Kennebunk: Replaced ~573 feet of obsolete 6-inch cast iron pipe with new 8-inch PVC pipe.
- Laudholm Farm Road, Wells: Replaced ~3,969 feet of obsolete 10-inch AC pipe (circa 1937) with new 16-inch PVC pipe as the final phase of a major two-phase project begun in 2020 to enhance the hydraulic capacity of the secondary transmission/distribution main that serves the densely populated, high demand coastal areas of Wells and Ogunquit.

In addition to the above projects, individuals and developers funded numerous water main extensions totaling 4,762 feet in length, as compared to 2,013 feet installed in 2021.

Drinking water quality remains a top priority. We continue to improve operational strategies with our unique blending of groundwater and surface water to assure consistently high water quality. We have also been working closely with our neighboring water utilities to the north and south to assure reliable interconnections and high water quality compatibility for when we need to share resources. All State and Federal water quality standards were met during 2022, and full water quality details can be found in the District's annual Water Quality Report from the Summer 2022 issue of What's on Tap. maintaining a dedicated, well-trained staff and continually upgrading our process equipment and control systems, we assure the highest degree of reliability in the quality of drinking water for our customers.

Kennebunkport Conservation Trust


Once again, the Kennebunkport Conservation Trust is pleased to report another successful year. Our budget was met and our properties maintained. We also received with gratitude, conservation easements on properties owned by Emily and Robert Ingwersen.

One of our primary areas of focus was Meadow Woods Preserve, where Ward Feurt oversaw the planting of a large pollinator meadow. The field was dressed with four to eight inches of topsoil, fertilized and planted with a smother crop of winter oats. Showy New England and native wildflower seeds were later spread, which should produce a wonderful display of color and life. The meadow is being named in loving memory of Patsy Bray Mahoney.

The Trust's relationship with the Kennebunkport Heritage Housing Trust and the town's leaders, continues to grow stronger as we all work and plan to provide the best community possible to present and future residents of Kennebunkport.


Another sister organization, with a separate 501-C-3, The Climate Initiative, continued its amazing work on a national scale. Find out more at: the climate initiative.org.

Kennebunkport Emergency Medical Services is a private, not-for-profit organization that provides emergency medical care and transport to the citizens and visitors of Kennebunkport. In addition to providing medical care for our community, we also participate in mutual aid agreements with the towns of Arundel, Biddeford, Kennebunk, and Wells. KEMS operates out of the Cape Porpoise Fire Station, where space is leased from the Atlantic Volunteer Engine Company for ambulance housing, office space and employee living quarters.

KEMS began in 1979 with a small group of volunteers and an old Cadillac ambulance donated to the Town by the Bibber family. Over the years, KEMS has seen an exceptional amount of growth from a volunteer organization to a payroll driven, not-for-profit per diem service. This change to our operational model allows KEMS to provide EMS coverage to Kennebunkport and our surrounding communities, 24 hours per day, 365 day per year with two paid staff at all times.

We employ a highly trained, professional group of 14 Paramedics and 22 Driver / EMT's of various levels. Our employees' professionalism, diverse levels of training and years of experience allow KEMS to provide the highest level of service possible through the skilled hands of our core group of dedicated EMS Professionals.

KEMS utilizes a tiered deployment response model that allows us to provide both Basic (BLS) and Advanced Life Support (ALS) levels of care. These care levels include but are not limited to immediate BLS access first response, life-saving CPR, and AED Defibrillation. This skill set is augmented by highly trained ALS providers that provide enhanced medical assessments. cardiac monitoring with **EKG** interpretation, defibrillation, IV/IO access. medication administration. Combined BLS and ALS response makes KEMS a dynamic, effective and efficient pre-hospital resource to Kennebunkport and our surrounding communities.

Our EMS providers at all levels are the heartbeat of our organization. Their dedication to Kennebunkport has continued in the wake of the Global Coronavirus Pandemic we all currently face. Challenges associated with the pandemic have drastically altered how our providers respond and provide patient care under extremely difficult and stressful circumstances. Through it all, our EMS providers' dedication has remained steadfast as they continue to serve the community on the frontlines of the healthcare system, allowing our organization and community to continue to thrive, grow, and progress towards the future.

In 2022, KEMS responded to 464 calls for service both in Kennebunkport and through mutual aid provided to surrounding communities. In addition to emergency medical calls, we also provided support to the Kennebunkport Fire Department, Police Department and Public Health Department upon request. At KEMS, we take our mission of Emergency Medical Care, Treatment, and Transportation seriously. As a standard, our goal always has been and will continue to be to treat each call and every patient with the highest level of professionalism, compassion, and respect.

Our dedicated cadre of EMS professionals covered a total of 730 Paramedic shifts and 730 Driver / EMT shifts throughout 2022. Shift coverage is broken down into 12-hour blocks covering both day and nighttime periods. This totals 17,472 hours of EMS coverage at the combined EMT and Paramedic levels. While these coverage numbers are impressive, these figures do not include all the other various training hours, courses or functions attended by our employees throughout the year.

KEMS operating expenses come from a model that combines capital from multiple resources. These resources primarily are the appropriation allocated from the Town of Kennebunkport, ambulance billing revenue for service, generous donations from the people of Kennebunkport from our Fund Drive, our Subscription Program and the KEMS Endowment Fund. The funding, donations, and revenue we receive are essential to maintain our current operational levels and future sustainability.

As the dedicated EMS provider for the Town of Kennebunkport, we would also like to recognize the hard work and dedication of the voluntary Kennebunkport **EMS** Board of Directors. Kennebunkport Fire Department, Kennebunkport Police Department, Kennebunkport Public Health Department, and Emergency Dispatch Staff. They truly are professionals and make each call for service a coordinated and successful event as we all strive to provide the highest level of service possible to those we are sworn to serve.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce you to our amazing staff.

During 2022 we served approximately 3,200 patrons and checked out approximately 2,200 book and media items. We also hosted 28 special events that were attended by 625 people.

We saw an increase in the number of people using our fax, print and notary services as well as many locals and visitors making use of our 24 hr. WiFi availability. As always, we want our patrons to have access to books and our team of volunteers will deliver books to homebound patrons. The Cape Porpoise Library is small, but our friends and patrons are super generous, unfailingly kind, and exceptional good deed doers. Scholarships Available

The Olympian Club of Kennebunkport Scholarship Fund was established in 1996 with gifts from friends members of the Club Olympian Kennebunkport. The fund is to benefit the University of Maine at Orono; however, campuses within the University of Maine system are eligible as well. Dedicated to "all the ladies who were ever members of the club" its purpose is to provide scholarship assistance for undergraduate students studying nursing. A second preference shall be for students in pre-medical/dental/optometry, and a third preference shall be for the students of any discipline. The minimum award is at least one-third of the tuition amount, including mandatory fees.
