

Loans have a fixed interest rate of 4.99% with a 15 year repayment period. Loans Question 4 enacts an ordinance that will allow Kennebunkport residents to make use of PACE, a State program that provides low-interest loans for energy saving improvements to their properties. The program can be used for Town residents to receive a PACE loan, the Town must adopt this ordinance. 
